Before we dive in, I just want to share a quick note on this episode. It was recorded on April 16, 2020, which was before our realities further changed as the movement for Black Lives reached a new momentous swell. Revisiting and editing this podcast became a call to practice grounding in times of deep change and to really reflect on the questions: "What is social cohesion in a time of disruption?" and "How can radical change come from looking back, and reimagining an unknown future?" So with these questions in mind, let's start the show.

So, what is the Urban Futures Lab Fellowship? Well, it's a program for young adults of color. And...Ashley, Sabrina, and I explore a range of topics to strengthen our skill sets and expand our networks.

We do this through modules where we learn about topics related to creative civic engagement, media production, personal development, and professional development. It's important for young adults of color to have opportunities to develop leadership, acquire knowledge, and build relationships. And...we do this over a course of two years. And this April 1st was our first year in the fellowship.

Ashley and Sabrina: Whoo hoo! Yay!

Ashley:

Yeah, and it's super exciting to have these opportunities to learn and grow. And through the course of the fellowship, we've also come to understand it's vitally crucial for this kind of

community centered work to have women of color—not just in the room doing the work, but also taking on leadership roles and really guiding that stuff.

Brisa:

Yeah. And so the Urban Futures Lab Fellowship is an initiative of Public Matters. And for those of you who are unfamiliar with what Public Matters is, it is a creative studio for civic engagement. And...we work at the intersection of community engagement, education, public health, the arts, and to learn more about the work that Public Matters does check out our website in the show notes.

But before we get any further, who are these girls screaming facts into the mic?

Okay, so my name is Ashley, and I am going to start referring to myself as a "baby artist," because that's what a teacher told me I was. I'm a baby artist, and I'm really interested into diving into filmmaking and I'm really interested in issues of like...broadly racial and class social justice. But also taking into account how that intersects with all of our other social and cultural identities. So that's what I'm interested in. And that's, that's what I like to do and explore as a career. That's it.

Hey everyone, I'm Brisa, I'm another one of your hosts in this podcast. Some of the things I'm interested in are urban planning, community stories, community narratives, and the outdoors.

Hey everyone, my name is Sabrina, I am a poet. I'm really interested in storytelling, and I love watching people share their art and all about community building.

Sabrina:

So why are we doing this podcast? Well, right now we're in the middle of our...one of our modules, which is "Social Cohesion in a Time of Disruption." And like, the question that we've been ruminating on is, what does that mean? And like, how do we stay connected and how do we stay engaged with each other?" Especially since we're all living in a time of spatial distancing, and there's been a lot of shifts in the world because of COVID-19, we really want to emphasize the importance of networking, especially as young women of color. And this is our way of not just building internally, but also externally and really making a point of creating meaningful work and building our creative networks.

So part of what we want to do is bring you into what our fellowship looks like. Because every time we try to explain to our friends what we do, nobody really understands and it's very confusing to them. So...

Sabrina:

We wanted to highlight some of our favorite moments, including learning moments and also challenging moments. Because now we're like...just started our second year and we really met a lot of people and made a lot of new friendships and connections and there's been just so many adventures along the way. And...so part of this podcast is exploring another medium and also building a new space for us to grow and also share that with the world.

So, we are inviting you all in to get a behind the scenes look as to what we do in the fellowship. And...who we get to hang out with, who we get to know, what kind of memories we've created with each other...And also some really hilarious things that have happened in the PM office.

So I'm gonna hand it over to Ashley, who's gonna set up what our first episode's gonna be about.

And especially through the Fellowship, we have these things called Supper Clubs—where we invite people who would be interested in the work that we're doing and who are also doing interesting work that we learn about as well. So these two people came together to have a conversation with us about their practice and their process. And I think it was a very powerful moment. Especially since the Fellows are all women, and having people at the dinner table who are also women and have their own personal experiences and stories. And it's really nice to be able to share that space with other people who are interested in the things that we are interested in. So thank you, Mike, for connecting us to interesting people and expanding our networks. And we appreciate you. And I know sometimes you are the only guy in a room full of girls, but it's always so fun and interesting to have you around. So shout out, Mike.
